

Ezra 4:1-24 “In the World You Will Have Trouble”**Icebreaker**

What’s something impressive you see now (a skill, a person, a movement) that you forget once started small or fragile?

(Introduces the acorn-to-oak theme and God’s power at work through weakness.)

Read: Ezra 4:1-24

Key Theme

The weak will overcome the strong by faith, and God will get the glory.

Discussion Questions**1. Faithfulness is Not Automatic (vv. 1-3)**

Why do we tend to assume that perseverance in faith is inevitable or easy?

How does the acorn-to-oak or caterpillar-to-butterfly imagery reshape how you view endurance in trials?

2. Subtle Compromise vs. Faithful Obedience (vv. 1-3)

Why was the offer of help from the people of the land actually dangerous?

Where are you tempted to accept “help” or partnership that could pull you away from faithfulness to God?

3. Choosing Obedience Over Approval (vv. 3-5)

Why was refusing this offer costly and risky for the returnees?

When have you faced pressure to compromise in order to keep peace, influence or opportunity?

4. When Faithfulness Leads to More Opposition (vv. 4-7)

How do these verses challenge the idea that obedience always brings immediate blessing?

How do you usually respond when doing the right thing seems to make life harder?

5. The World’s Spin on God’s People (vv. 8-16)

How do the accusations in Rehum’s letter reflect a worldview opposed to God?

Where do you see faithfulness to God being labeled as “rebellious,” “harmful,” or “dangerous” today?

6. God’s Work Delayed, Not Defeated (vv. 17-24)

Why does God sometimes allow His work to be stopped for a season?

How does knowing the end of the story (the temple and walls completed) encourage you in seasons of delay?

7. Weakness, Waiting, and Christ’s Victory (John 16:33)

How does Jesus’ promise help us live faithfully in a world that opposes God?

Where do you need to trust that God is working even when you feel weak, stalled, or oppressed?
